

# Jane Lackey: A Space to Enter, July 6 - August 6

**Location:** Autzen Gallery at Portland State University, second floor of Neuberger Hall (NH), next door to Shattuck Hall Annex (SH) **Hours:** Open 10am-5pm during normal weekly business hours.

Exhibition Open House: Meet and Greet the artist, 5-6pm, Friday, August 4 during Exhibition Open House 5-7pm.

**Details:** A Space to Enter, an exhibition of mixed media works by nationally known artist Jane Lackey, is co-sponsored by the American Craft Council. Lackey is an ACC Fiber Fellow. The exhibition includes works from Lackey's Enclosures, a series of drawings on translucent paper. In the words of the artist, these drawings "combine spatial characteristics of architecture or landscape schema that echo the intricacy of body systems. Each locate the familiarity of a place remembered, imagined, entered. Map-like, their scale, delicate thread lines or jagged cut tape engage the intimacy, time and provocations of close viewing." Lackey is a visual artist based in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Her recent drawings and installations explore analogous relationships between cloth's over/under interconnections and social hooks of language and communication.

# **KEYNOTE SESSIONS**

Sheila Pepe, Thursday August 3, 7:15pm

Surface as Cultural Agent

The textile surface conveys more than its making. It can reveal possibilities of both utility and meaning and through its construction works as a powerful cultural agent. This talk will explore the agency of textiles using historical models, like that of the silk road, to highlight the promises and pitfalls of contemporary work in textile design and "object hood." Sheila Pepe is best known for her large-scale, ephemeral installations and sculpture made from domestic and industrial materials. Pepe is also known as an educator who likes to trespass the boundaries of fixed disciplines in art and design. She is now a Core Critic in the Painting + Printmaking Department at Yale University. During the conference, she will also lead a session with students.

# Josh Faught, Friday August 4, 9am

The Cosmetic Affect of Darkness

Josh Faught's studio practice has triangulated spaces between personal history, social/political history, and the history of textiles. He combines textiles, pop cultural detritus, and archival materials to address the relationships between language, community, and constructions of identity. He operates from a premise, suggesting that if political rhetoric is, at its core, a desire to communicate, the ability to speak through textiles allows us to embrace a personal/political continuum that is at once fragmentary, experiential, and physical. Faught is an Associate Professor at the California College of the Arts in San Francisco and Oakland with a wide-ranging exhibition record.

# Jane Lackey, Friday August 4, 7pm

The Substance of Marks

Over a number of years, visual artist Jane Lackey has used multiple processes, surfaces and mark making systems to summon invisible aspects of identity and connection. Her lecture will focus on the conceptual and material substance of marks as both individual and collective signifiers. Her long-time affinity with the medium of fiber is inspired with scientific curiosity, the chemistry of physical sensation, reductive, micro pathways of mapping and durational spatial experience. She will discuss how recent works trace illusive spatial information and communication first as mapped schema on paper and then emerge as enveloping installations that align place with audience interaction. An ACC Fiber Fellow, Lackey's presentation is sponsored in partnership with the American Crafts Council. She is a visual artist based in Santa Fe, NM. Her exhibition, *A Space to Enter*, is on display in the Autzen Gallery, on the second floor of Neuberger Hall (NH), next door to Shattuck Hall Annex (SH) at PSU.

# Aram Han Sifuentes, Sunday August 6th, 9am

Towards the Decolonization of Fiber Art

Aram Han Sifuentes considers the act of protest and how it speaks through the end of the needle in the hands of immigrant laborers in and outside the garment industry. She will discuss her most recent projects: Official Unofficial Voting Station: Voting for All Who Legally Can't (2016-2017) and Protest Banner Lending Library (2017) along with US Citizenship Test Sampler (2012-present), all of which address themes of immigrant labor, immigration policy, citizenship and skill sharing and exchange. Aram Han Sifuentes uses a needle and thread to speak of her experiences as a first generation immigrant. She earned her MFA in Fiber and Material Studies from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

With discussion following, participants will collectively build an open-source glossary of useful terms for understanding the complex and interwoven worlds of material culture, textile production, studio art practice, critical thinking/writing, intersectional understanding, globalization and civic engagement.

This panel will investigate the future of materiality and the role new processes play in the ideation and fabrication of wearable products.

Notions of the Pacific: Lessons from Water in Times of Change

Mary Babcock combines a presentation of her own artistic practice with that of artists she explores for an upcoming curatorial project: *Liquid Archives: Climate Change in the Asia Pacific.* This presentation offers a unique perspective by focusing on the works of contemporary textile artists in Oceania. In her own practice, Babcock engages textile processes with non-traditional materials like ghost nets and ropes reclaimed from Pacific waters and tributaries. She is currently Professor at the University of Hawaii.



# Kiranada Sterling Benjamin, Session 4, Centrum Studio

Art, Meditation and the Creative Spirit

Kirnanda Sterling Benjamin gives a lecture on exploring the connection between meditation practice and the creative process in the studio. She also discusses her year-long experience on a Solitary Retreat in New Zealand. "Daily, we hear of the current 'mindfulness movement,' the growing interest in silence, the scientifically proven benefits of a quieter life and of meditation. As a fiber artist, educator, curator, author and renunciant with 35 years of meditation practice, connections between art and silence weave through my daily life, reinforcing my hope that my interests and research might benefit others." She is a resident of New Hampshire.



# Patricia Courtney Gold, Session 3, Centrum Studio

Introduction to Northwest Native Plateau Textiles—Basketry

Experience the 12,000 year Heritage of Plateau baskets with traditional geometric designs. Learn about full turn twined baskets, twined false-embroidered flat baskets, and imbricated coiled baskets. Pat also discusses the labor intensive work of harvesting and caring for plant fibers, which involves harvesting indigenous plant fibers, processing them, then weaving with these fibers. Pat's ancestors lived along the Columbia River for more than 12,000 years. She was born and raised on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation, Oregon. She helped revive the Wasco technique of full-turn twine. Besides doing artwork, Gold lectures about the Columbia River Native cultures to universities and Museums.



# Jo Hamilton, Sessions 1 & 2, Fiber Surface Design Studio

Tethering Meaning One Knot at a Time

Jo Hamilton presents a slideshow on the progress of her own work, as well as a tabletop demo, working on a piece already in progress. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, Hamilton works in Portland and was recently featured in *American Craft* magazine.



# **Ja Young Hwang**, Session 3, DPP Photography Studio

Sustainable Upcycle Design Project: Sock Dress

In this session, Ja Young Hwang describes the creative design process used to create a contemporary upcycled garment through use of re-purposed and post-consumer materials, which are knit socks. This project combines concepts of fashion deconstruction and the golden ratio. She is on the faculty of Kent State University, OH.



# Jeana Eve Klein, Session 3 & 4, DPP Painting Studio

Conceal and Reveal: Inkjet Printing on Recycled Fabrics

Jeana Eve Klein introduces digital inkjet printing on recycled fabric substrates with strategic coatings of gesso, gel medium, and digital ground to conceal or reveal the digital image and the original fabric. Her recent studio practice has coalesced around the broad theme of value: how society in general assigns value (or worthlessness) to objects, and how the art world, specifically, assigns value to works of art, craft and design. Klein is Associate Professor of Fibers at Appalachian State University.

# Amy Lund, 4 repeated sessions, outdoor Fibers Area Courtyard

Visible to Invisible: The Transitional Sweet-Spot of Clothing to Paper

Amy Lund demonstrates not only the basics of Western-style papermaking, but also the benefits of considering the physical and conceptual contents of handmade paper. Using the worn-out garments of her family, Amy explores the transitional sweet spot of turning these well-loved and used pieces of clothing into wonderfully soft, irregular, tacitly inviting surfaces. A book artist and papermaker, Lund is a recent MFA graduate of OCAC.

# Jorie Johnson, Session 3 & 4, Fiber Surface Design Studio

Working with The Felt Maker's Mind

Jorie Johnson will discuss and demonstrate the felt maker's strategies. "I believe the thinking process is 95% of the work of art. What is good wool and why? How does the migration of the wool fiber affect what can be done and how to achieve it? I will demo cord-making, joining of elements, how to make hollow objects, production of multiples and produce unique "floral" accessories ready to use upon drying as a vehicle for the demonstration." Johnson lives and works in Japan.

# Gretchen Morrissey, Session 1, DPP Photography Studio

Sustainable Studio: Design and Environmental Responsibility

Gretchen Morrissey addresses her background as a textile designer/ printer, the evolution of her design work, and steps leading to responsible and sustainable studio practices. Morrissey reeducated herself on alternative non-toxic ink and dye solutions for printing on textiles and paper, consciously shifting to environmentally responsible studio practices. She is a resident of North Carolina.

# OCAC FabLab: Cece Cutsforth, 4 repeated sessions in FabLab

Integration of Digital Cutting Tools into the Making Process

In this session, artist Cece Cutsforth will introduce attendees to digital cutting tools and how they can enhance an artist's practice. Cutsforth will present examples of the development of paper prototypes for 3-D conceptualization in book arts and metals. Additionally, participants will learn how digitally-cut vinyl can be used for fabric surface enhancement.

### **OCAC Weaving Studio**: Jessica Hickey, 4 repeated sessions

Image to Textile on the TC2 Digital Jacquard Loom

In this hour-long demo, Jessica Hickey shows the process of editing an image, creating, and assigning weave structures along with live operation of hand weaving the newly created file on the loom. Watch from start to finish the process of converting a photographic image into a woven cloth using Oregon College of Art and Craft's TC2 Jacquard loom.

### SDA 8, Session 2, DPP Photography Studio

The Power of Eight: Making the Way for a Successful Artist Group

The framework for this group presentation is "forming, storming, norming and performing," devised by psychology professor Bruce Tuckman. Participants will share the challenges and successes they have had through each of these stages, and will offer a case study with images, stories and our action plan. Attendees will learn some of SD8's best practices that result in successful exhibitions. The session will also introduce the Exhibition Guidebook and Checklist that are available to all SDA members, and will be followed by a Q & A. Power of Eight members are all Minnesota SDA members: Anna Carlson, Karie Amstutz, Diana Eicher, Marjorie Fedyszyn, Kristin Hoelscher-Schacker, Debra Maertens, Kristi Kuder and Ann Ribbens.

### Adrienne Sloane, Session 1, Centrum Studio

**Unraveling Political Knitting** 

Adrienne Sloane's presentation focuses on the historical roots of knitting and politics through the lens of American wartime knitting, while including an overview of current trends. Special focus will be paid to to "yarn bombing" or "yarn graffiti". The presentation will also incorporate the artist's own political imagery with attendant stories resulting from using knitting to convey political messages. A resident of Boston, she teaches and exhibits internationally.

# Susan Stover, Session 1 & 2, outdoor table near Ceramics Building **Encaustic** and Fiber

Susan Stover gives a physical demo on working with encaustic and the many other mediums that can be combined with it. There will be discussion of the various characteristics of wax as a unique material to work with, contemporary artists working in the medium, and the combination of other processes such as printmaking, photography, fiber, paper and book arts. A resident of Portland, Stover's work was featured on the cover of the Wax & Fiber edition of the SDA Journal.

Collaborative Components, ongoing collaborative project

In this hands-on session, Andrea Vail presents a workshop on her ongoing project Friendge. Friendge invites participation from the community to build an ornamental border which symbolizes inclusiveness rather than exclusivity. Vail will provide participants with the materials to make tassels, will discuss the impact of small gestures, and explore strategies for collaboration in your communities. A resident of North Carolina, Vail is exhibiting a past version of Friendge in Crossing Generations: Past, Present & Future at OCAC's Hoffman Gallery.



# Wendy Weiss, ongoing art installation, DPP Building

Excavated Pattern: Digitally Cut Vinyl to Interpret Indian Block-Printed Textiles Found in Egypt As curator of the textile collection at Ashmolean Museum, Oxford, Ruth Barnes undertook the task of cataloguing well over 1,000 textile artifacts from the Newberry Collection dating from the 12th to the 16th century. This exceptional collection and scholarly document is freely available online and is the foundation for this artwork. The fragments on average are typically under 15" in length and width, yet reveal complex patterns, captured through digital tools to reintroduce them to conference attendees. Weiss is the Guest Editor of the Summer Making Our Mark Issue of the SDA Journal.



# Wildcraft Studio School, 4 repeated sessions, Fiber Area Dye Studio

Wild Color: Natural Dye & Sustainable Practices

During this presentation Wildcraft artists will demonstrate how to extract color from a variety of natural dye sources using sustainable practices. Participants will learn about different natural dye sources and how to extract color from them. They will be able to sample the dyes using wool, silk & cotton fiber. WildCraft is a Portland and Washington-based studio and school, offering workshops for adults in contemporary craft practices, studio art, plant medicine and land-based skills.


